Hereford Cathedral and Kenchester Water Gardens



Leaving BC at 9am. Private tour of the 15c Cathedral Gardens spread over four acres, includes Courtyard, Cloister & Vicars Garden, Choral Garden, Deans Garden and Bishops Garden. Split into two private tours 11am and 12 pm. The latter two gardens are not usually open to the public. Extra time for enjoying other areas of the cathedral such as The Mappa Mundi and Chained Library (optional - tickets to be bought by individuals). There is an excellent cafe or you could bring your own packed lunch, but save room in your tummy for afternoon tea included in the price at:

2.15 pm we make our way to Kenchester Water Gardens which is justifiably proud of being the Holder of the National Collection of Hardy Water Lilies. There are over two hundred varieties, most of which are available to buy as potted plants. We will have time to relax with tea/coffee and cake and stroll around the beautiful water gardens, visit the nursery and shop before leaving at 4.30. Arrive back at BC approximately 5.30 pm.



Tickets will cost £20 for members and £23 for non-members and will be available from our meeting in March.

Open Gardens weekend – 22nd/23rd June

As I mentioned before, we have been asked to represent our club in an exhibition of floral displays in the church over this weekend. Elly Bibby (our new Club Secretary) has kindly agreed to help me and we have both been busy researching. The theme is "Shropshire Legends" so we have chosen to represent the famous gardener and broadcaster, Percy Thrower. He has many local connections including being Park Superintendent in Shrewsbury from 1946-1974; he helped the post war revival of The Shrewsbury Flower Show and was Chair of The Shropshire Horticultural Society. His fame spread through appearances on television and radio programmes including Blue Peter and Gardener's World – the latter being presented from his home "The Magnolias" in Merrington, near Shrewsbury. In 1970 he and a partner bought a local nursery, Murrell's of Shrewsbury. This was later sold and demolished to be replaced by the Percy Thrower Garden Centre we know today.

This is a brief flavour of our research but we would like some input from Members:

Does anyone know Percy Thrower's daughters- Margaret, Susan and Anne- and how to contact them? Margaret (the eldest) was an honorary member of our club!

Does anyone have any books written by Percy Thrower?

He has three plants named after him: a rose, an aster and sweet peas. Does anyone have these which we could incorporate into our display? Would anyone like to grow the sweet peas for us to use?

Does anyone have a pipe we could borrow?!

Or old garden tools?

Or any other memorabilia/ possible props/photos?

We want to do our club proud so please support us in any way you can. The committee was very keen that we should not have to buy in flowers (as many exhibitors do) so once we have worked out our colour scheme, we shall be asking for donations of flowers and foliage from your gardens in June – particularly roses, fuchsias and chrysanthemums, which were among Percy's favourites.
