#### **Bees**

As you probably know, we are focussing on bees this year. We have two talks in March and April on honeybees and pollinator plants and we are planning mini trips to Minsterley Meadows and Sarah Jameson's 11.4-acre meadow near New Invention, in May and June. The club donated money towards the purchase of the former last year. To learn more about Sarah Jameson you can put "weboughtafield" into your search engine.

One of the joys of being on the committee is learning from the other members — it has been brought to my attention that honeybees are only a very small part of the picture. Our wild bees pollinate trees, flowers and crops more efficiently and on a much bigger scale than farmed honeybees, so I am going to feature one of the two hundred and fifty species of wild bees each month, in our newsletter.

Tree Bumblebee (Bombus hypnorum) – one of the four most common bumblebees in the UK.





These are easily identified by the ginger thorax, black abdomen and white tail. They traditionally nested in trees but have adapted to colonising nest boxes, house eaves and compost heaps, since arriving here in 2001. They live in woodland, parks and gardens. Their favourite sources of pollen and nectar are comfrey, shrubs like bramble, fruit trees, fuscia and other garden plants. They can be seen between March and July.

Our UK bees are in severe decline for several reasons including habitat loss, pollution and climate change. We would not be able to survive without the vital roles they play in pollinating crops used for animal feed, wild flowers and trees, which then support other insects, birds, bats, mammals and everything up the food chain with food and shelter.

Out of the more than two hundred and fifty species of bees native to the UK, twenty-four are bumblebees while the rest are solitary like the masonry and mining bees. The Red Mason bee is one of the most important pollinators, being around one hundred and twenty times more efficient than non-native honeybees.

The shipping of managed honeybees between countries brought varroa mite (a parasite) to the UK in the 1990s. Combined with a rise in other diseases it nearly wiped out wild honeybees completely. It is now threatening bumblebees too. Farmed honeybees can out-compete native bees for food and nectar, which is a particular problem in cities like London, where urban bee-keeping has reached unsustainable levels that threaten other bee species. Asian hornets have had a catastrophic impact on wild bees in France, preying on both solitary and bumblebees.

#### How can we help?

We can stop using pesticides and plant lots of nectar rich, bee friendly flowers – don't forget the seeds we gave you for Xmas! In the 2024 RHS Bumbles on Blooms study, bumblebee garden favourites for Feb and Mar included crocus, heather, honeysuckles, grape hyacinth, mahonias, hellebores, flowering currants and daffodils. Follow on with comfrey, lungwort, rosemary, chives, aquilegia and foxgloves. Make room for dandelions too. We can also provide shelter – bee hotels need to hang in sunny, sheltered spots.


A group of us went to this last year and thoroughly enjoyed the day.

#### <u>Peat</u>

The RHS has launched a free service to help answer questions for all gardeners (not just RHS members) who want tips for success with peat-free growing. Queries will be tackled via email, by Nikki Barker, RHS Peat Free Transition Technical Co-Ordinator at peatfree@rhs.org.uk. Research has been done with eight nurseries across the UK; also, irrigation trials in growing media from six major manufacturers from Spring 2023 – Autumn 2024 including herbaceous perennials at Allensmore Nursery in Hereford. Dr Raghavendra Prasad, the Research Fellow who conducted the trials says: "Peat-free growing media differ from peat-based mixes in physical, chemical and biological properties, including water demand and moisture retention. Home gardeners need to be aware of the differences. Always check before you water plants in peat-free compost, by either pushing your finger in to feel for moisture or by lifting the pot to check weight. It can look dry on top but hold plenty of water lower down the pot."
