Mini trip to John's Garden and Ashwood Nursery

Monday 7th July

John's Garden is the private garden of John Massey VMH (Victoria Medal of Honour, the highest honour awarded by the RHS), owner of Ashwood Nurseries, Kingswinford. It is situated behind the nursery in a canal-side setting, in the lovely open countryside of South Staffordshire. John says, "A garden is a place full of memories and stories of friends who have inspired you and generously shared their knowledge and their plants...there is nothing wrong or right in a garden. It is what you like which is important".

John acquired the nursery as a teenager straight from school, with no formal training but was encouraged by his grandfather who taught him the principles of gardening. Now the speciality hepaticas, hardy cyclamen, hydrangeas, conifers, snowdrops, lewisias, salvias and primula auricula have won international acclaim and the award-winning hellebores are regarded as "simply the best strains ever produced". To date, the nursery has been awarded fifty-three RHS gold medals.

It should be no surprise that such a passionate gardener has developed one of the finest private gardens in the UK, featuring magnificent collections of trees, shrubs, herbaceous perennials and conifers. There is all year-round interest with an abundance of rare plants as well as familiar favourites. Many fine features include a stunning pool and rock garden, an Anenome pavonina meadow, a rare tufa garden and a dramatic fern stumpery. John's Garden has been on TV and in numerous articles – Carol Klein said "It is the most loved and looked after garden I've ever had the pleasure of visiting".

We are having a brief introductory talk at 11.30 and then we will be free to explore the garden at our own pace. Gardeners will be on hand to answer any questions.

There will be time to look at the glasshouses, plant sales, garden shop, gift shop. Lunch is available in the tea rooms from 12-2pm. We are asked to stagger our lunchtimes to avoid long queues. Picnics are not allowed in the garden and there are no seating areas for eating your own food. Eating on the coach is the only option.

Bees

As part of our focus on bees this year, I am writing about different bumblebees each month.

In the UK, solitary bees are a diverse group, comprising of nearly 250 of 270 bee species found here. Unlike honeybees and bumblebees, solitary bees do not live in colonies with a queen and worker bees. Instead, each female constructs and provisions her own nest, often in solitary holes in the ground, in wood or walls. Common types include mining bees, mason bees, leaf cutter bees and hairy-footed flower bees.



Mining bees are among the most common solitary bees, with many species nesting in the ground. The Tawny Mining Bee is a well-known example, easily spotted by its fluffy, fox-red coat.

Becoming a Plant Guardian

As many of you know SWSGC subscribes to Plant Heritage home to the National Collections! Part of the work PH does is safe guard plants that are either threatened with extinction or in need of further cultivation for fear of becoming threatened with extinction part of their extensive conservation program. Many establishments such as Great Dixter, Hampton Court palace, Wollerton old hall and Powis Castle hold many of these plants even Buckingham Palace etc.

Members of Plant Heritage can register as 'Plant Guardians'

Here is how it works; A plant guardian gets a free plant/s to look after and propagate and share into the wider community, each plant guardian registers the plant/s they hold with PH, the register is to help keep track of these precious and often exceedingly rare cultivars. Many of the plants are easy to care for and the full range of plants are offered in an annual 'plant exchange' for Plant Heritage members, sadly Shropshire does not have a group anymore so we don't get to be part of it, so I, Mellie, have registered myself with the Hereford group.

This year I have asked the conservation officer of Plant Heritage if as a 'group' the garden club could join the scheme.

I took the initiative and asked for quite a few plants from the plant exchange, as you can imagine garden plants and bulbs are very popular for ease of maintenance and for the rarity value, such as rare snowdrop bulbs, usually these have hundreds of people asking for the same bulb...often only one available! So, I went for some less popular plants such as pelargoniums, which need over wintering and succulents.

I have had delivered some absolute 'corkers'!! Just small young rooted cuttings that are all very special and endangered, many from Hampton Court Palace Surrey.

If members of the Garden Club would like to become a 'guardian' of a plant then I have a selection which I will bring to the July meeting. Mandy and I will be on hand to register you as a Plant Guardian and you can choice a plant from the selection on a first come first serve basis!

I stress, that if the plant dies there is no 'guilty' pressure you just need to let me know that it passed away. Each plant gets a special label.

Once the plants are big enough for propagation we can share with each other. There is no cost so even those on a tight budget can take part. I only ask that plants are not sold on, if anyone has propagated then it should

firstly be offered to the group and if not wanted by a group member please offer back to the scheme. Or if you have friends or relationships that would like to be a plant guardian they can register with Mandy or myself. I think this will be really good fun, and we will be adding to conservation of cultivated plants so that future generations can enjoy their beauty.
