Bees

As part of our focus on bees this year, I am writing about different bumblebees each month. This month is the turn of the Hairy-Footed Flower Bee – how could I resist with a name like that! It is a solitary bee species, common in gardens and other urban areas, particularly in southern England. The male emerges from hibernation first in late February/early March. They prefer to nest in soft mortar or soil. The male is rusty brown with orange hairs on the middle legs and feet. The female is black and furry with bright orange pollen baskets. They are important pollinators for early Spring plants like primroses, lungwort and comfrey. They have a quick darting flight which helps to distinguish them from bumblebees.

Becoming a Plant Guardian

As many of you know SWSGC subscribes to Plant Heritage home to the National Collections! Part of the work PH does is safe guard plants that are either threatened with extinction or in need of further cultivation for fear of becoming threatened with extinction part of their extensive conservation program. Many establishments such as Great Daxter, Hampton Court palace, Wollerton old hall and Powis Castle hold many of these plants even Buckingham Palace etc. Members of Plant Heritage can register as 'Plant Guardians' Here is how it works; A plant guardian gets a free plant/s to look after and propagate and share into the wider community, each plant guardian registers the plant/s they hold with PH, the register is to help keep track of these precious and often exceedingly rare cultivars. Many of the plants are easy to care for and the full range of plants are offered in an annual 'plant exchange' for Plant Heritage members, sadly Shropshire does not have a group anymore so we don't get to be part of it, so I, Mellie, have registered myself with the Hereford group. This year I have asked the conservation officer of Plant Heritage if as a 'group' the garden club could join the scheme. I took the initiative and asked for quite a few plants from the plant exchange, as you can imagine garden plants and bulbs are very popular for ease of maintenance and for the rarity value, such as rare snowdrop bulbs, usually these have hundreds of people asking for the same bulb...often only one available! So, I went for some less popular plants such as pelargoniums, which need over wintering and succulents. I have had delivered some absolute 'corkers'!! Just small young rooted cuttings that are all very special and endangered, many from Hampton Court Palace Surrey. If members of the Garden Club would like to become a 'guardian' of a plant then I have a selection which I will bring to the July meeting. Mandy and I will be on hand to register you as a Plant Guardian and you can choice a plant from the selection on a first come first serve basis! I stress, that if the plant dies there is no 'guilty' pressure you just need to let me know that it passed away. Each plant gets a special label. Once the plants are big enough for propagation we can share with each other. There is no cost so even those on a tight budget can take part. I only ask that plants are not sold on, if anyone has propagated then it should firstly be offered to the group and if not wanted by a group member please offer back to the scheme. Or if you have friends or relationships that would like to be a plant guardian they can register with Mandy or myself. I think this will be really good fun, and we will be adding to conservation of cultivated plants so that future generations can enjoy their beauty.

For Veg growers: Real Seeds

Mandy Ford buys seeds from this company and says they are very good quality. In their newsletter, they point out that "when you're surrounded by summer vegetables, it's easy to forget that it's important to sow now to keep the harvests coming through into winter. If you're limited on space, sow in modules or small pots so that you can fill in gaps in your plot as you harvest".

What to sow this month

- Carrots (direct only, ideally by 3rd week July)
- Beetroot & Fennel to eat from autumn into winter
- Turnips, winter radishes & kohlrabi for winter salads & stir fries
- Mizuna, mibuna & Chinese cabbage plus spicy mustard greens for cooking
- Successional showings of lettuce (but beware, it won't germinate if temperatures are too high) & annual herbs
- Other salad crops including claytonia, rocket, corn salad & winter cress
- Chicory and endive
- Other greens including winter varieties of true spinach, plus last chance for kale, chard & leaf beet Start spring cabbage varieties from mid-July-August in modules or a seedbed ready to plant out in early autumn.

Recipe: Rhiannon's baby courgettes with lemon & basil

Every year in the height of the glut I search for new and exciting ways to cook with courgettes, but when the first few appear I like to keep it simple. It feels really decadent to pick courgettes when they are so tiny, but they are utterly delicious and tender.

Ingredients:

However many baby courgettes you can pick, with their flowers A couple of cloves of garlic Half a lemon Extra virgin olive oil A large handful of fresh basil

Slice the courgettes and flowers lengthways, and check the flowers for insects.

Fry the courgettes in a generous glug of olive oil for a few minutes each side, adding in a clove or two of crushed garlic.

Once the courgettes are golden, add in the grated zest of half a lemon, and the courgette flowers- cook for a few more seconds until they are wilted.

Season with salt and pepper, a squeeze of lemon juice and chuck in a generous handful of basil.

This is delicious eaten straight away, or cold as a salad.
